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#### ROYAL HUDSON TO TOUR WESTERN STATES

Locomotive 2860 "Royal Hudson" will make a one-month excursion through the States of Washington, Oregon and California during the spring of 1977. Starting in Vancouver, British Columbia the engine and its display train will spend a month going to Los Angeles, California and return. It is expected to operate under its own power for most of the trip. The purpose of the display is to encourage Americans to visit the Province of British Columbia.

The popular "Age of Steam" exhibit that has been touring the Province for the last two years will be a part of the consist. Two other cars will feature British Columbia and royal visits to the Province. Invited guests of the Ministry of Travel Industry will have priority in seeing the display with the general public being allowed entry when time permits. Time has been set aside in each city for public visitations.

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## PNW CHAPTER'S EQUIPMENT SEES SERVICE

The Chapter's two pieces of rolling stock, baggage/dorm 76 and sleeper/lounge "Mt Hood" are both currently in service on two different steam operations. They are fast becoming some of the best-known cars in the United States.

Car 76 is probably the most photographed baggage car in railroad history. Not only has it been the crew car behind the American Freedom Train's 4449, but was also used behind their ex-Reading T-1 #1. Little did anyone realize when the car was donated by BN that this ex-SP&S car would sit out a hurricane in Rhode Island, climb the Pennsy's Horseshoe Curve, and spend a winter in Florida.

The Mt Hood is the only private car in the Pacific Northwest that sees service on Amtrak trains. It was the car behind AFT's 4449 in the official AFT photograph of the engine. It will bring additional fame when it brings up the markers on the Royal Hudson's tour of the western United States in March 1977.

Both cars have paint schemes quite different from their original colors. The 76 is now red, white, and blue while the Mt Hood is a deep Tuscan red.

#### CHAPTER BULLETIN BOARD

Dues for 1977 should be paid as soon as possible to Chapter Treasurer Roger Sackett. This applies to full memberships as well as "Chapter-only" memberships. Dues may be mailed to the treasurer at the address shown inside the front cover of this issue, or paid in person at the regular meetings.

The revision of the Chapter's by laws providing for an annual budget and other financial controls has been rewritten to read as follows:

The Chapter Board of Directors shall submit a budget to the membership for approval by the February meeting of the current year. Any expense or commitment in excess of a single budget item must be approved by the Board. Any expenditure or commitment of Chapter funds in excess of \$300 over the approved budget in any calendar year for any single budget item must be approved by majority vote of the membership present at a regular meeting. No funds are to be borrowed by the Chapter without approval of the membership. Any purchase, lease or sale of real property, or purchase, lease or sale of railway operating equipment must be approved by majority vote of members in attendance at a regular or special meeting, regardless of the amount involved, except leasing of Chapter owned operating equipment for a period of less than 15 days.

The Chapter treasurer may advance Chapter funds not to exceed \$100 to the Excursion Director in connection with Chapter approved excursions. All receipts from excursions are to be submitted directly to the Treasurer for deposit in the Chapter account and are not to be paid out in cash for excursion expenses. The Excursion Director shall file a complete financial report on each excursion with the Chapter Board of Directors within 30 days of the excursion.

Due to the late publication date of the February 1977 issue of "The Trainmaster" (#200), the vote on the amendment will be ostponed until the March meeting.

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## "MOUNT HOOD" EXCURSION TO VANCOUVER, BC

The Chapter's sleeper-lounge car "Mt Hood" will move to Vancouver, BC via Amtrak on Saturday 5 March 1977 to join the BC Government's tourism promotional train. A one-way excursion for Chapter members has been arranged as part of the movement of the Mt Hood. The fare is \$14 per person for bedroom or roomette space and \$10 per person for coach space. The fare includes transportation and refreshments. Please note that the car will be unheated due to movement on trains with Amfleet equipment. The return trip to Portland via Amtrak at regular fare is an additional \$20. It may be possible to spend the night on the Mt Hood, but those going should be prepared to stay in a hotel if necessary. Members who have signed up for the trip should mail their checks in at once.

#### PNW CHAPTER NRHS

Summary of Minutes, Regular Meeting, 21 January 1977

The January meeting was called to order by PNW Chapter President Bill Bain at 8:05 PM in the Burlington Northern Safety Assembly Room.

The minutes of the previous meeting, held on 19 November 1976, were approved as read.

Chapter Treasurer Roger Sackett was no present to give a report.

Ed Immel reported on progress of the 1978 NRHS national convention:

- 1. Gil Hulin will put together a slide program to advertise the convention. Slides are needed. The proposed program is to be about ten minutes long.
- 2. Committees are to be formed soon. Volunteers are asked to see Ed.

Ed Immel reported that he has inventoried the timetable in room one. There are about 4,000 public timetables. Ed stated that the objective for 1977 for room one is to make a complete inventory of all the m aterial stored in the room.

Chuck Lund reported on the status of the car Mt Hood: The mechanical committee is studying the purchase of a heating device for the car. Any brake work is to be deferred until enough revenue is in sight to justify the expense.

Secretary Chuck Storz read the revised financial amendment to the Chapter's bylaws. (Editor's Note: The full text of the amendment is reprinted on page 6 of this issue under "Chapter Bulletin Board".)

The proposed amendment will be published in the February issue of "The Train-master" and will be voted upon at the February meeting.

Ed Immel reported that the 4449 will probably return to Portland over a southern route and via Southern Pacific most of the way. The move, as presently proposed, will be via Jackson, Mississippi; New Orleans, Louisiana; San Antonio, Texas; Sanderson and El Paso, Texas; Tucson and Yuma, Arizona; Los Angeles, San Louis Obispo, and Oakland, California. The 4449 is scheduled to leave Birmingham, Alabama after Easter and arrive back in Portland, Oregon about 5 May. There is a possibility that PNW Chapter may be able to operate one excursion from Portland to Seattle and return immediately after the locomotive returns.

Chapter President Bill Bain stated that the Chapter's goals need to be spelled out and that the members' help will be needed to achieve these goals. The 1978 NRHS national convention, which will be hosted by Pacific Northwest

Chapter, will be a major project in itself. There is much material in room one that is in excess of our needs and can be sold. The Chapter can begin an estate counciling program. The Chapter needs a proper budget and will begin this year to draw up a budget annually. The "Railfan's Guide to Oregon" should be updated and republished. Sales made during the return trip of the 4449, if done, will need staffing. Opportunities for excursions for the enjoyment of the membership will be explored. President Bain also stated that he will assign areas of responsibility to each director, including the writing of a budget:

Don Davison reported that Leonard Woodford has the bell and whistle from the UP 3203. Bill Bain asked Don to arrange to pick up the bell and whistle from Woody who now lives in Wenatchee, Washington.

Chris McLarney suggested that the editorial on the 4449 which appeared in the November 1976 issue of "The Trainmaster", Number 197, on pages 9 and 10 be submitted to a number of railfan publications to publicize the cold hard facts of the situation. President Bain stated that he will ask the Board to formulate a resolution of the idea.

President Bain also reported that he recently met with a number of railroad officials in Portland and offered any help that the Chapter could give. Bill asked that any contacts with the railroads be made through the Chapter's Officers.

Ed Berntsen reported as follows:

- 1. The Royal Hudson will leave Vencouver, BC about 19 March 1977 with a promotional train to advertise tourism in British Columbia. The train will run directly through to California with only operational stops enroute and then will proceed north with promotional stops at a number of cities. Ed Immel will be the trip coordinator. Train movements will be mostly during daylight hours. No passengers will be carried.
- 2. Amtrak has cancelled a number of local trains operating out of Chicago early in the week of 17 January due to extremely cold weather.
- 3. Graham Claytor has been nominated by President Carter to be Secretary of the Navy. No change is likely in the Southern Railroad's steam operations.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 PM. Refreshments were served by Cora Jackson during the intermission between the business session and the program..
